It's been an eventful year in our neighborhood. There have been lots of changes.

- Foster Park is undergoing positive longterm changes, thanks to those who spoke up about earlier proposals! The Parks department asked for more *input*, *listened*, and a *better* plan emerged!
- In Southwood Park, a City grant paid for new benches and landscaping on Arlington Avenue.
- 41 new street trees, Emerald Ash Borer treatments continued, and plans for more trees made!


Erika Stuller-1125 West Lexington Avenue
