Roundabout Landscaping Redesign

In 2019, the Board of Directors hired a gardener to tend to neighborhoods pocket gardens that had become overgrown and unruly. Since that time, the Beautification Committee has also managed to start and maintain other programming such as neighborhood cleanups, dumpster days, tree seedling giveaways, a new native garden and the creation of a neighborhood flag. All of those tasks have been completed. It's time set our sights on the most monumental task of them all: redesigning the Old Mill Roundabout. It's a cornerstone of our neighborhood and we'd love to see it shining again! But, we're going to need your help.

Fundraising—The Board of Directors estimates that a conservative redesign of the roundabout will cost approximately \$10,000. This goal can be accomplished in a number of ways: an ARCH Home and Garden Tour with the proceeds going directly to the roundabout redesign; donations; selling Historic Southwood Park swag; and contributions from the association budget.

Design—After years of heavy trims and weeding, the roundabout is thriving and overgrown. Many of our 20+ year old spirea are dying. Beautification Committee Volunteers could remove a large number of plants to create a more clean and tidy baseline for redesign. Any healthy plants that are removed will be taken to other pocket gardens, or offered to residents before being composted.

Execution—But in the meantime, we're looking for your input on the redesign and would love to see the following elements in your renderings and idea submissions: Welcome to Historic Southwood Park Signage; Lighting; Drought tolerant full-sun flowers, trees and shrubs; Solution for tire ruts in the grass on the east and west sides of the roundabout; Improved pedestrian safety such as crosswalk striping and improved signage. Right now, nothing is off the table so show us what you've got! While we all would love to get this completed sooner rather than later, keeping a loose timeline will be of great benefit to the volunteers taking on these tasks. When a more concrete plan has been set in motion, a timeline will be posted here and on our website.

We Need Your Help—In order to stay within our \$10,000 budget, we will need a massive volunteer effort that ranges from manual labor to digital design and everywhere in between. There's space for everyone to help. Visit https://www.historicsouthwoodpark.com/roundabout-redesign, to let us know how you can help!

We are partnering with Clean Drains Fort Wayne, an initiative started by Friends of the Rivers and City Utilities, to make sure the storm drains in our neighborhood remain free from pollutants as they carry rain water to our rivers. As part of this effort, all 176 of the storm drains in our neighborhood need new permanent medallions affixed to them, but we can't do it without your help!



We need a team of at least 12 individuals who have been looking for ways to engage with and serve our community to join us!

Your volunteer tasks would be: Remove any trash, debris or weeds from the storm drain. Install medallion on storm drain in accordance with Friends of the Rivers & City Utilities directions. You will be provided with: A lawn bag for your trash and debris, a map of the drains you are responsible for, installation directions, and medallions.

INN Improvements in Works

The Southwest Area Partnership (SWAP) is a coalition of all the Show your Southwood Park pride for all to see! neighborhoods in the southwest quadrant of the city. SWAP voted on how to spend \$250,000 of Investing in Neighborhoods Now (INN) funds in our quadrant.

SWAP voted to spend money on trees. Southwood Park and Fairmont requested to plant trees along both sides of Fairfield Avenue from Rudisill to Pettit.

Parks will benefit. Money will be spent to restore Foster Park Pavilion #3 and redesign Packard Park. A pocket park at Rudisill and Fairfield is being replanted.

Several homeowners were awarded Home Improvement Grants, based on income and need.

Money is also being dedicated to sidewalk repair. Southwood Park got the biggest chunk including sections along Pettit at South Wayne and Pettit at Indiana. We know there's a lot more that need help, but this is a start.

Fall Leaf Pickup – Pros and Cons

Plan now how you will tackle the tide of leaves. Will you rake, bag, or mulch? We have laid out some of the pros and cons of each choice. Whatever you do, please don't put leaves in the street.

Raking - How It Is Supposed to Work:

Rake your leaves into your park strip – the area between your curb and the sidewalk. City crews are scheduled to pick up leaves on the south side the weeks of November 8-12 and December 6-10.

Raking – a Realistic View:

City crews usually fall off the posted schedule, due to weather and understaffing. If you rake your leaves to the curb too early, it will not do your yard any favors in the short term. But—it will grow back!

DO NOT RAKE LEAVES IN THE STREET.

This causes clogged storm drains and flooding. It causes an increase in local water pollution by placing unneeded nutrients in stormwater. It also creates a traffic hazard by limiting the spots where vehicles can safely pull over.

Bagging – How It Is Supposed to Work:

Place your leaves in brown paper biodegradable leaf bags, set them at the curb and call 311.

The leaf bags will be collected within two business days of your call to 311. Weather permitting, bagged leaf collection will continue through 2021. In March 2022, the Street department will announce Hours are 8-6 daily except Sunday, noon-6. two additional weeks of bagged leaf collection.

DO NOT PLACE BAGS IN THE STREET.

Bagging – a Realistic View:

It takes time and money, but you can keep your yard clear. The wind may have other plans...

Burning – a Realistic View:

Nope. Don't even go there. If your neighbor is burning leaves or trash, phone 911 to reach the Fire Department. They will remind your neighbors that it is not 1947. A fine could result.

Mulching - How It Is Supposed to Work:

Mow your leaves to hasten leaf breakdown, and leave them in place. Mulching creates nutrients for your lawn and garden for the coming

There is already an inch and a half of acorns on the ground in some places. How will another 5 inches of leaves possibly break down this winter? :-)
